REFLECTIONS FROM PASTOR JOHN



It's true – to a person, we've all had those "if only" moments. If only I had ... if only I could ... if only I had known ... then ...

Here at Plymouth First, we're going to tackle this matter of what makes us happy as we launch our fall ministry. We hope to emerge far better positioned to understand and appreciate that this thing called happiness has far more to do with **Who** than it does with **What**. Andy Stanley reminds us that we all discovered playing at a young age that it didn't matter what we didn't have as much as who we were with that made the big difference in the moment. As long as we were with the right bunch of **uhos**, it was bound to be a better day.

Ratchet that understanding up to where you're at in life today. Jesus promised to be with us always, unto the very end of the age. If we are not feeling as close to Him as He desires, who might be the one responsible? Is God the one responsible for having moved in separate directions? What lies at the heart of that sense of distance from God we've experienced along the way?

Our hope is that you will plug into our corporate worship, our small group and classroom opportunities being offered to provide environments for each one of us to grow closer to God, our true selves, and one another as we engage in our study of **What Makes You Happy – It's Not What You'd Expect**.

Towards that end, I invite any and all who are interested to join me and others on Wednesday nights at 6 pm, beginning on September 13, as we begin a trek through the book of Hebrews. We will merge our church-wide study with this bold proclamation (found in Hebrews) that we can stand before and with God, confident of His favor, assured of His help, and encouraged to walk with courageous pluck toward our Eternal inheritance as we follow Jesus in faith that He meant what He said and said what He meant. Nobody understood, nor understands better than He that there are things that separate us from Him and one another. Jesus loves us so much that He offered Himself as our great High Priest and as the perfect, once and for all, effective sacrifice enabling us to be restored to

right relationship with God and one another, and no book in the New Testament provides a more eloquent understanding of Jesus' Death, Resurrection, and Ascension and the significance of what all of that means for your life and mine.

Listen to this glorious aftermath: "Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that He opened for us through the curtain (that is, through His flesh), and since we have a great High Priest over the House of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for He Who has promised is faithful." God hopes for us to immerse ourselves in the grand reality of what that means – you and I can live our lives with a clean slate and the blessed assurance of being able to approach the Throne of Grace confident that God remains faithful, regardless of our past or present failures.

Yes, there is a way for us to experience true happiness in life and it has everything to do with the **Who's** involved. As His Body, as His family, we are encouraged in His Word to inspire one another to love and do good deeds, not neglecting to meet with one another, as is the habit of some.

Ephesians 4:32 *Instead, be kind to each other, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you.*

I just had the greatest week! I wore my Youth Pastor hat and spent a few days with our youth for Mission Days. The theme of the week was Random Acts of Kindness, and the youth definitely put those words into action.

Let's see, what were some of the things they did? They fed lunch to homeless people in Detroit and they baked cookies and delivered a plate of them to the staff across the street at Praise Baptist. They worked at the community garden in Westland, weeding, planting, and harvesting vegetables to be distributed by the Salvation Army.

Then they spent a day in Ann Arbor doing street acts of kindness. Here's a short list of some things they did. They paid for people's coffee, picked up trash, gave change for parking meters, and distributed free bubbles and stickers to kids. They held doors and helped people with packages. They complemented people, smiled at workers, and in general tried to brighten each person's day.

Mixed in with the work over the week was some time to have fun. We rode the Q-line in Detroit to Campus Martius Park and got Detroit Water Ice. While at the park, some of us walked to the Riverfront and played a game of chess with the giant pieces on the sidewalk. In Ann Arbor we ate at the legendary Blimpie Burgers, and showed each other some of our favorite stores in Ann Arbor. All in all we had a great week.

It's funny how much work it was to do the random acts of kindness at the beginning of the week, and how easy it became as the week went on. Being nice to others is contagious. Once you start, it becomes easier and easier, and then eventually it becomes a habit.

This fall we're going to be using the study, "What Makes You Happy" as the basis for the message/sermon series and adult Sunday School. One thing that makes all of us happy is helping others. To be able to make someone else's day brighter is a double blessing. A blessing for the person receiving the action, but also a blessing for the giver.

Mission Days was just one of the youth events this summer. We started the summer with a cook-out, then headed out to ASP. We had a scavenger hunt in downtown Plymouth. Then a few weeks ago we held Tribal Wars. Tribal Wars is a competition between teams of youth, with games of skill and knowledge. Team Yellow was the winner for this year.

I want to thank a few people who have been big givers this summer to the youth program. Karen Morin, Amy Brown, and Stacy Buster have all helped run events and chaperone youth. Cathy Montgomery has been key in helping with the communications. Pat Fleming holds down the fort in the office when I'm out. Most of all I want to thank Sarah Sutphin, who has been by my side all summer. She is a wonderful example of a Christian woman, and a great role model for our youth.

I want to close with a story from our trip to Ann Arbor. One of the teams gave a gentleman some money to pay for his coffee. He said he didn't need the money, and for the youth to find someone to give the money to. Yet, they insisted that he was the one they had chosen. So he accepted the money and the youth continued their journey.

As fate would have it the youth saw this gentleman again in their travels. They witnessed him paying for someone else's coffee. After he completed the transaction, the gentleman walked away with a big smile on his face. He had earned the lesson of the day; it's a blessing to be kind to others.

Like I said, doing random acts of kindness can seem scary at first, but it gets easier. Won't you join our youth in changing the world, one random act at a time.

So proud of the youth and their hearts of love and service!



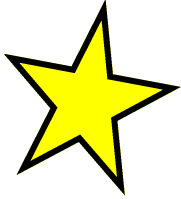
